

The numbers above were assigned by me and are quite arbitrary, with no particular significance, also the details given of the headstones are transcriptions of my notes and indicate the information as I could best discern it, but do not reproduce the style or exact wording of the original unless indicated by quotation marks.

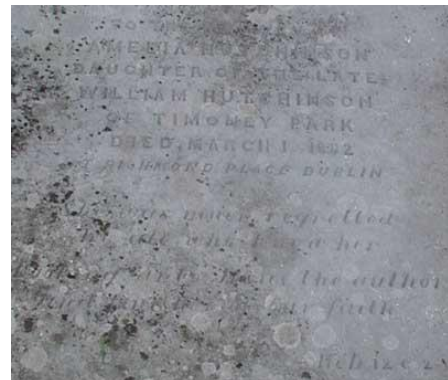
This view is looking north towards the back wall of the graveyard, with stone 11 nearest to the camera,



just right of centre. Stones 16 to 19 are visible on the back wall. A local man called Jim Ryan published a History of Knock Parish in 1980. In it he records that the wall-mounted stones commemorate members of the family whose remains are not interred in the plot, such as a soldier who died in India. The horizontal stones have suffered greater weathering than conventional, vertical headstones; also at least two different types of stone appear to have been used and one has fared worse than the other. It is also worth noting that the length of the inscriptions varies considerably. Note the contrast between the inscriptions to Summers (?) and to Joseph Fade (10).

1. Amelia

Amelia Hutchinson daughter of the late William Hutchinson of Timoney Park. Died March 1st, 1882 at Richmond Place, Dublin.



2. Anne, betrothed of William, daughter of William Hutchinson of Timoney Park, died at Richmond Place “died in the well”?

6. John Dawson

John Dawson Hutchinson.

Died December 21st 1881 in his 87th year.



7. Elizabeth Anne Hutchinson, wife of John Dawson Hutchinson, daughter of John Lloyd of Lloyd's House. Died March (?) 19th (?) 181? Aged 23.
8. Christiana Lidwill (?) wife of Frederick Lidwill (?). Daughter of William Hutchinson, died June 28th 1855
10. Joseph Fade Hutchinson, born September 29th 1808, died February 4th 1885



11. Maria, daughter of William Hutchinson of Timoney Park. Died February 2nd, 1882 at Richmond place, Dublin.
12. Charles (?) Dawson Hutchinson of Timoney Park, died at Golden Grove
14. ? Lloyd Vaughan Golden Grove
15. Anna Christiana Parker (?) beloved wife of ? of Castle ?
21. This is recorded by Jim Ryan as the grave of a policeman called Dyer who died in 1860 and is buried here with his wife Mary who died in 1869. He says that Dyer was stationed in Timoney barracks and promised John Dawson Hutchinson that he would guard the Hutchinson family, dead or alive.
